

Year 11 Destination Report: 2023 Cohort

The cohort were offered a variety of interventions to support them in achieving positive destinations. All of the cohort were offered formal careers interviews with Adviza¹, and all has access to informal support with Mrs Christiansen (Careers Lead). Careers and options support were offered to all students, this included talks from FE Colleges / apprenticeships, and opportunities about open days etc.

The chart below represents the actual destinations from the 2023 cohort

Out of the 145 students, all students were successfully tracked and their actual destinations were confirmed. Of the 2022 cohort 68 students remained on roll at Larkmead joining the sixth form, 2 students joined other school 6th forms these were John Mason & Cokethorpe (private school)

We have 3 students who are currently in employment with no training, all within the construction industry. 2 students moved out of the area, both are attending FE colleges.
